As We See It: Occupying, Supporting "Elderhood"

I (Peggy) just returned from the 2016 National Village Gathering in Columbus, Ohio, where more than 270 Village leaders from across the U.S. got together to share their respective Village experiences, lessons learned, and visions for the future. In the rush of addressing the daily needs of our members and the organizational needs of our Village, we often lose sight of the fact that we are part of a movement to **occupy elderhood**. "Elders" (a term suggested as an alternative to "seniors," "senior citizens," etc.) want to remain in our homes and community as we age. To accomplish this, we have created neighborhood Villages by building volunteer corps that provide needed services and by developing innovative programs to enable elders to remain connected to others and the community.

The return from this conference was on the heels of gearing up for our annual appeal that will kick off on #GivingTuesday, which this year is on November 29th. Maintaining and expanding our services and programs take financial resources. Many of you may not realize that our member dues cover less than half of our operating expenses. We try to keep our dues affordable and offer scholarships where needed so that we can open the Village to all elders living in 20910 and close-in neighborhoods.

Please note: This year one of our generous supporters has agreed to match new gifts, both entirely new donations as well as increases in donations over last year, up to a total of \$3,000. New dollars that you donate to Silver Spring Village between now and December 31, 2016, will be matched!

Members have been discussing current events and books, playing games (chess, Scrabble, bridge), having coffee and restaurant meals, seeing classic movies, and hearing speakers on climate change, caregiving, satellites, and more. The event described below was part of our SPARKLE series, which the Village cosponsors with Silver Spring Town Center, Inc.

In October, Professor Mark Leone of the University of Maryland Archaeology Department gave a tour of a special exhibit at the University of Maryland Hornbake Library. His engaging presentation explored Frederick Douglass' birthplace and life on the eastern shore of Maryland through artifacts found at Wye House, including tools, symbolic items and cookbooks, all of which provide insights into the lives of those who worked and lived there. Professor Leone has been director of Archeology in Annapolis since 1981, where his work continues to serve the needs of historic preservation through the scientific and scholarly work of un-

How to . . .

...become a member: Residents of zip code 20910 are eligible for full or associate membership. Persons living close to, but outside 20910, are considered for full membership on a case-by-case basis. Associate membership is open to all applicants regardless of place of residence. All members can attend events, get discounts from local businesses, receive a subscription to Washington Consumers' Checkbook, access our information service, and get referrals to professionals. Full members can also receive services from our volunteers such as transportation, indoor and outdoor household help, technology support, friendly visits, and check-ins. Membership dues cover only part of our operating expenses and are: Full: \$350/individual or \$450/couple; Associate: \$150/individual or \$250/couple. ...volunteer: People age 18 or older who support our "age in place" mission are invited to serve as volunteers. Volunteers are not required to be members of the Village (though they are welcome to join, and many do). They need to complete an interest form and application, and have a background check. Training is provided. All applicants must be officially accepted and enrolled by the Volunteer Coordinator before performing tasks for the Village. All sorts of skills and interests are welcome.

Volunteer Corner: Buddying Up

It's that time of year again when the weather is changing from warm to cold. We are well into autumn and winter is right around the corner.

Many of you are already aware of our Storm Buddy Program where full members are matched with volunteers who live close by who can help out in weather-related emergencies. As part of the full member enrollment process a "storm survey" is completed to determine what the needs may be. Once we have this information, we match the member with a volunteer buddy who helps out in a number of ways. When we begin to hear forecasts of snow, ice, tornados, hurricanes, or even heat waves, volunteer storm buddies are asked to reach out to their member buddies to make sure they are prepared for what is being predicted. During the weather emergency, the volunteer buddy might again make a check-in call to confirm that the member buddy has electricity, and is doing okay. After the weather emergency is over, the volunteer buddy checks in again periodically to make sure that all is well with the member buddy.

In the next few weeks, I will be contacting all current storm buddies, both volunteers and members, to confirm that they would like to stay with the program.
